Sip champagne in Champagne

Those heading to France’s Champagne wine region are usually only heading there for one reason – to clap both eyeballs and taste buds on the sparkling wine produced in the country’s northeast. We’ve selected three of the best Champagne tours to check out when you are next in that neck of the woods.

E-bike day trip

For those happy to mix in a little bit of exercise with their enotourism, A la Francaise operates a day trip around Champagne on an e-bike, which includes lunch, a stop at two producers, and a visit to the village of Hautvilliers, ex Reims. The tour lasts 10 hours, and includes a total of eight Champagne tastings, as well as a visit to the home of Dom Perignon.

Small Group day tour

Another tour departing from Reims, France Intense’s take on Champagne explores two of the region’s best-known sparkling wine producers, Moet & Chandon and Taittinger. Also visiting the Avenue de Champagne in Epernay, this eight-hour tour offers transport in an airconditioned minivan, and limits itself to eight travellers per departure, which ensures personalised attention.

90 minute visit

For those who may not have half a day to devote to wine tasting, this 90-minute tour with In Vox Veritas is known for allowing its guests to avoid the crowds, as it explores a cellar dug by hand in the region’s chalky soil. Led by an interactive and passionate guide, travellers will taste three Grand Cru Champagnes across an hour and a half, we think that’s pretty good value!

Help for Kiwi travellers

Travel agents in New Zealand have been thrown a lifeline by the Kiwi government, which has agreed to help fund them in their efforts to secure refunds and credits for their customers whose travel plans have been crushed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Just as in Australia, agencies across the Tasman have had their businesses shattered by coronavirus but have continued to work on their clients’ behalf to secure refunds from suppliers.

Almost NZ\$50 million in funding has now been provided to help them out,

with agents to be paid a small percentage of any refunds or credits which will help them to keep business afloat.

It’s estimated that about \$700 million in prepaid holiday funds is being held by overseas suppliers, which the NZ government hopes will be diverted into local spending as a result of the initiative.

Cruising gets even cleaner

Despite the disruption of COVID-19, the world’s cruise lines have continued to improve their environmental credentials, with Cruise Lines International Association (CLIA) last week releasing its annual sustainability report.

Compiled by Oxford Economics, the study tracks work by global cruise operators investing in new technologies including cleaner fuels, exhaust gas systems, food recycling, shoreside power & advanced wastewater systems.

The expansion of the global passenger cruise fleet has seen the investment of over US\$23.5 billion in vessels offering greater efficiency, an increase of \$1.5 billion in just the last 12 months.

CLIA said the report reflected its firm belief that it is “integral, urgent and feasible to balance fostering growth with policy and technology changes that help preserve the air and oceans in which the industry operates”.



Wipe that gin off your face

The experience of meeting the maker, tasting their creations, and picking up a bottle or two to take home is no longer restricted to the world of wine. Craft gin distilling has gathered pace in Australia, with a collection of hidden gems producing quality products scattered around the country. We've uncovered some of the gin distilleries which are making a splash.

New South Wales

Rose's pure botanical distillates to create their own signature blends.

Archie Rose Distilling Co.

Archie Rose produces a range of gins, whiskies, vodkas and rums and lays claim to being "Australia's most highly awarded distillery". Founded in 2014 and located in Rosebery, Sydney, the distillery welcomes visitors looking to learn about the process and range and try their hand at creating their own spirit onsite. The blend your own gin class walks visitors through the history of gin and how it's made at Archie Rose, followed by the chance to blend a selection of Archie

Earp Distilling Co.

Newcastle's Earp Distilling Co bar and distillery was created to share the mysteries of the distilling world with its visitors. The tasting bar adjoins the distillery and lab, with viewing windows showcasing the distillery operations. Visitors can kick back for a guided tour, tour and tasting, or for the full experience, a three-hour class at "Spirit School" which sees participants distil their own gin.

Victoria

The Whiskery

The Whiskery is the cellar door for Bellarine Distillery and is set in a restored original farm shed. The distillery was established in 2015 as the first on the Bellarine Peninsula. It was also the first in the greater Geelong region since the closure of Corio Distillery in the 1980's. A range of botanicals are grown on the property and combined with other Australian botanicals and flavours the world to create unique gins.

Queensland

Kalki Moon Distilling & Brewing Company

Bundaberg is known as Australia's rum capital, but it is also home to Kalki Moon Distilling & Brewing, which produces gin, vodka and liqueurs. The small batch distillery focuses on quality over quantity and uses premium ingredients in its gin, including lemon myrtle, cinnamon myrtle, ginger and native finger limes. Kalki Moon shares its passion through free guided tours, which are followed by a tasting.

Western Australia

Margaret River Distilling Company

Margaret River Distilling Company is the distillery behind Giniversity Gin, which is known for using native botanicals to add a local twist. The Giniversity experience invites its students to mix and match botanicals and each "graduate" leaves with a bottle of gin that reflects their own personality and palate. Experiences include a blending class and distillation class. Next door to the distillery there is also four-star chalets available, which are set amongst seven acres of natural bushland.

Tasmania

Nonesuch Distillery

Located just 15 minutes from Hobart Airport, Nonesuch Distillery combines local botanicals alongside more traditional ingredients. This saw it develop its Sloe Gin, made using sloe fruit picked from old hedgerows around the state. The fruit is then soaked in gin until the ideal colour, taste and aroma are achieved. Visitors are invited to step inside the craft distillery to meet the founder or distiller to learn how its gins and whiskies are produced and to taste the range.

South Australia

Kangaroo Island Spirits

Kangaroo Island Spirits opened as South Australia's first boutique distillery in 2006. Gin is the distillery's headliner, but it also produces a variety of liqueurs and vodkas. Kangaroo Island Spirits has an emphasis on using local and native ingredients and produces gin distilled using mulberries and native juniper. Pop into the distillery for a blend your own gin experiences or book a table for a group in the Gin Garden to sample some signature cocktails.

Australian Capital Territory

Big River Distilling Co.

Big River Distilling Co. creates artisan spirits using quality ingredients and developed by an ex-winemaker. Drop into the Distillery Door at Big River, located near where the Molonglo River and Lake Burley Griffin join, for a guided tasting of its gins and vodka. For a more comprehensive experience, book a tour and tasting to learn about the science behind making gin with the founder and distiller, followed by a tasting of three of Big River's core range of spirits.

Take four

Enjoy the journey and the destination with four of the world's longest train routes.



The Canadian: Toronto to Vancouver, Canada

Travelling across three-quarters of the world's second-largest country, The Canadian is an epic journey that sets out from Toronto's Union Station. The train crosses amazing scenery as it passes through the Prairies and the Rocky Mountains before it hits the coast and Vancouver. The ride is further enhanced by sleeper cars and the chance of seeing moose, deer and even bears from the windows.

Indian Pacific: Sydney to Perth, Australia

Spanning the entire continent of Australia, the Indian Pacific explores the vast wilderness of our sunburnt country. The sheer distance is most apparent as it crosses the Nullabor and travels the longest stretch of straight railway track in the world, when passengers will not see a bend for 478km. The route includes stops in Broken Hill, Adelaide, Port Augusta and Kalgoorlie.

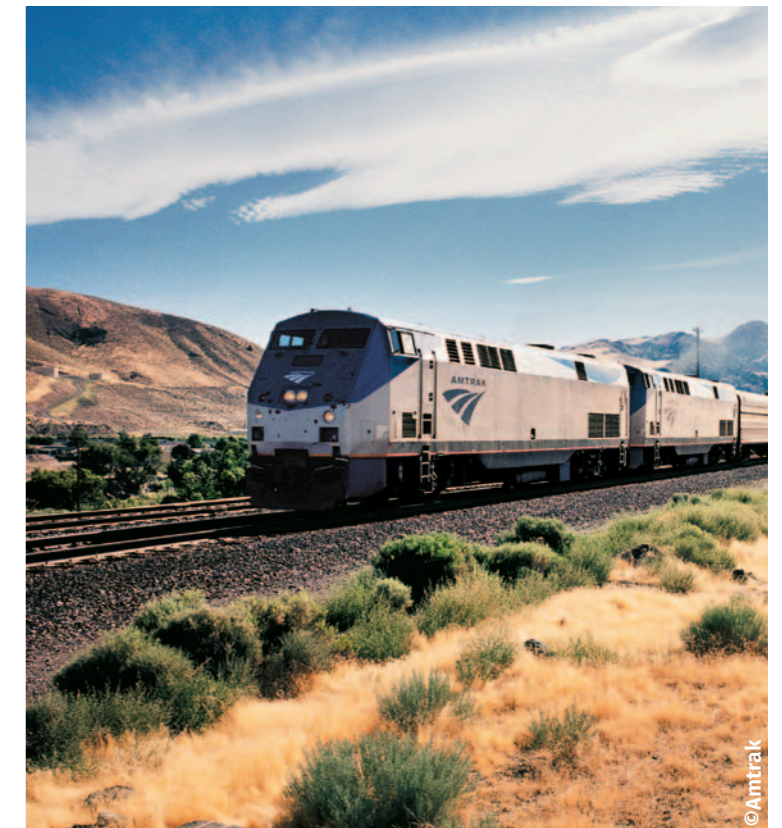


The Trans- Siberian: Moscow to Vladivostok, Russia

The grand-daddy of them all, the legendary Trans-Siberian rail journey spans seven timezones and takes six days as it departs from Moscow on its journey to the far eastern Russian port city of Vladivostok. The scenery includes the Ural Mountains and Lake Baikal, the largest freshwater lake in the world. Popular alternatives to the route include the Trans-Mongolian to Beijing and even an option from Moscow to Pyongyang in North Korea.

California Zephyr: Emeryville (San Francisco) to Chicago, USA

Taking a little more than two days, one of the longest train journeys in the United States traverses the range of landscapes America has to offer. From the beaches in California, the journey passes by the Colorado River, the Rockies and the Sierra Nevada range as it makes steam through eight states to America's third largest city, Chicago.

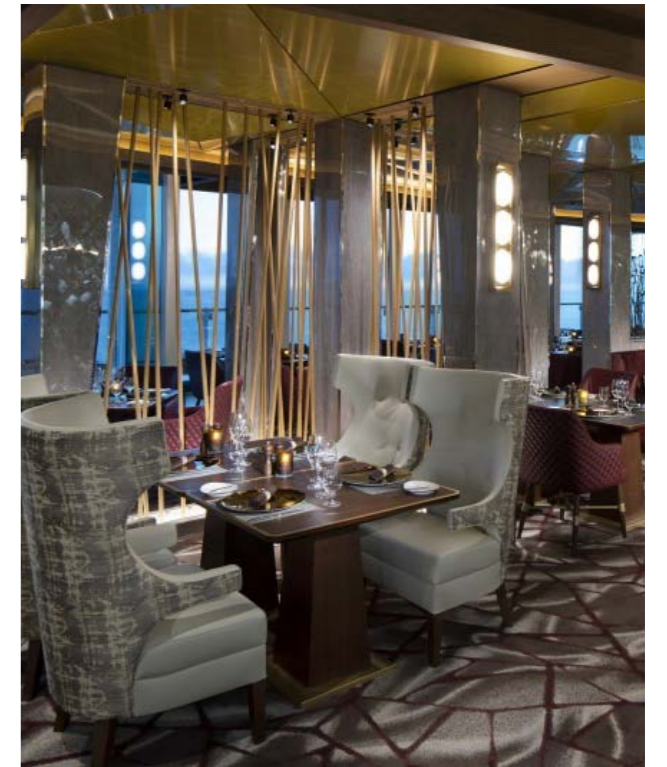
Polo Grill Oceania Cruises

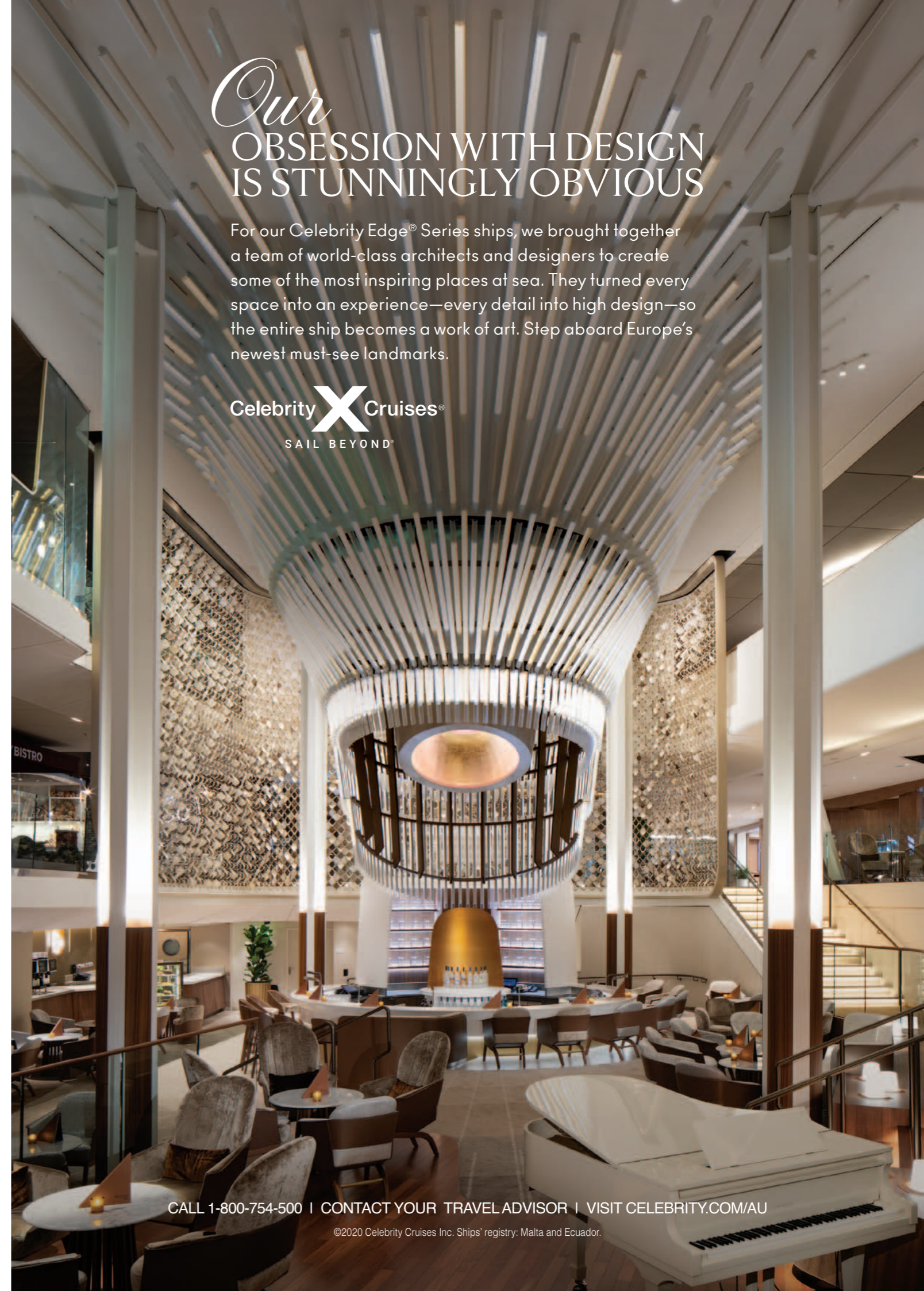
Prime C Azamara Club Cruises

Zen Time Gin

This week's cocktail is a gin-based drink and hopefully will bring you a bit of zen. The cocktail combines matcha with gin and lime and even better, doesn't require any special cocktail-making equipment - a smoothie shaker or blender bottle will do.

Ingredients

1/4 cup mint leaves
 3/4 oz honey
 3/4 oz lime juice
 1 1/2 cups water
 2 1/2 oz gin
 1 tsp matcha
 Ice cubes

Method

Add ingredients to cocktail shaker (or smoothie shaker or blender bottle) and shake until all the matcha is dissolved. Strain into a glass and add ice cubes and extra mint to garnish.
